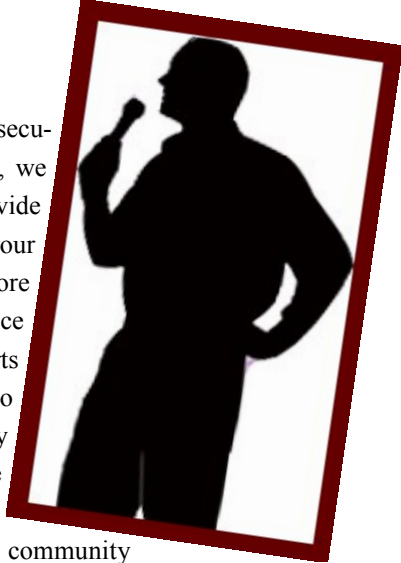

In 2002, the Maricopa County Attorney's Office created the Speakers Bureau. Offered as a free public service, the Speakers Bureau provides basic, useful information in an effort to keep the citizens of Maricopa County aware of public policy, social issues, crime trends, crime prevention and the criminal justice system. To date, more than 15,000 citizens have attended a presentation from a member of the Speakers Bureau and more than 500 presentations have been given since the Bureau was created.
